	2 ½ yards of fabric for the background of your border blocks (light in value or dark in value) This will make your blocks and border black of a dark color is easy and makes things pop!			
	A good range of fabrics for a scrappy and fun border. I use brights and bold colors. These borders can also be lovely and soft or folksy and warm. You choose the feel your celebration might be as it is your quilt. Many people use country fabrics for their choice. In other words you do not have to use brights.			
	I suggest having many 1/3 yard cuts and some ¼ yards cuts and then leftovers chunks and scraps that will all coordinate with your quilt color feel. I like choosing three to four colors and then building on those colors. So, for example, I might have 10 to 14 soft blues, and 8 soft yellows and 15 great reds and a black or two for sparkle. You can choose any three colors (or more) and perhaps you have some fabrics that have all colors in them to throw in the mix. This makes my quilt scrappy because the fabrics are all different but the colors will all pull together (<i>if you follow what you have just read</i>). NOTE – when people bring old projects to cut apart borders, they are disappointed (<i>usually</i>). Don't try to make some-			
	thing leftover as a lovely border (just my two cents).			
	Remember, this is your artist's palette!

I will be discussing I fabric personalities and your buying habits.

Maybe you will discover some new things about the way you buy that you didn't know before. I do not use any fabrics containing white unless many of the fabrics in my stash contain white. I will discuss this.

Then, after the borders are all done and attached, you will build your "story" objects with the leftovers from your borders and other fabrics you have brought. We will be discussing the power of color and fabric choices. I have changed this in that you can begin with your blocks and then start working on your story. I will bring lots of examples.

This sounds more difficult than it is-see how creating is easy and fun!

We will also be learning what makes life a celebration and why we need to celebrate each day. Prepare to come and make new friends and smile for this multi day workshop.

FAIRY GIFTS

I have bought tiaras for class participants for years and love the whimsy it creates. It's fun and every story quilter deserves a tiara!

Years ago we started doing fairy gifts in class. A fairy gift is a little something that a person makes (pin cushions, earrings, pot holders for example), or things like seeds and garden gloves from the dollar store, lotions, cheap and fun jewelry, knick knacks, fabric, thread, sewing doodads, pincushions you find a good deal on, shoe laces, trims, pins etc etc etc.

The gift is placed by sewing machines when most people are not there. Then when you come to your machine, we say "the fairies stopped by." This is optional. But most people participate because it is fun and everyone loves it.

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
